Eliminating Health Disparities Initiative

The Eliminating Health Disparities Initiative (EHDI) is working with the Somali community to build the skills necessary to prevent diabetes, heart disease, and stroke. The EHDI program also hosts the Minnesota Community Health Worker (CHW) Peer Network, and provides continuing education opportunities for Minnesota's diverse CHWs.

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Reproductive Health: The Somali Child Spacing Program and the Karen Family Planning Program

The Somali Child Spacing Program and the Karen Family Planning Program provide culturally appropriate reproductive health education and resources to both the Somali and Karen communities, and to health care providers serving them. Grounded in a health benefits, client-centered approach, Somali and Karen CHWs assist Somali and Karen men and women to understand their reproductive health options, and how to access resources and care. Staff also work with providers to increase their cultural sensitivity, which improves their work with Somali and Karen patients.

WellShare continued its long-term work in reproductive health and added two new USAIDfunded projects in 2014. Through Advancing Partners and Communities (APC), the Advancing Community-Based Access to Injectable Contraceptives in Uganda project worked to scale up access to injectable contraceptives in Eastern Uganda.
